The following is a report by President, Pat Bell of the Visit to the Sorting Office:

Sixteen members visited the Carlisle Mail Centre. After a brief history about mail in Carlisle from 1675 to the present day, we toured the Centre to see mail being sorted 25 years after the move to Junction Street, from behind the Warwick Road Post Office. Mail posted in and for delivery to the DG & CA post codes is processed here, much is sorted to the walk for delivery. Up to 220,000 items are sorted daily, but at Christmas time the Centre handles an average of 711,000 posted and a further 311,000 items due for delivery, on the busiest days. With Christmas on the horizon, once more we were asked to avoid sending bookmark cards and the small cards, because the system could not cope with them, thus hand sorting is necessary and delivery may be slightly delayed. Red envelopes are also difficult for the system to

We all thoroughly enjoyed our experience and after refreshments, repaired back to the rest of the meeting for Soup and Rolls prepared by members. As previously stated the members not taking part in the visit enjoyed a Beetle Drive which was won by Olga Hetherington. This really gave us an indication of the weight of a full coat of armour that the soldiers had to wear. He also explained why the equipment the soldiers used was far superior to anything that their

enemies wore.

The whole evening was a fascinating insight into the life and fighting equipment of the Roman Soldiers who guarded Hadrian's Wall.
