NEWLIFEBOAT

Silloth RNLI lifeboat station has become the first in North West England to operate the most technologically advanced inshore lifeboat in the rescue charity's fleet – the Atlantic 85.

The £160,000 lifeboat went into service on November 15th and replaces Silloth's 13 year old Atlantic 75 lifeboat, Spirit of Cumbria. It has been funded by a generous legacy from Cheshire man Don Wilkinson, a long time RNLI supporter, and the lifeboat is named Elaine and Don Wilkinson in honour of him and his wife.

Silloth RNLI lifeboat operations manager, Eddie Studholme, said: 'The crew are all very impressed by their new lifeboat, which is faster and more capable than our previous Atlantic, and we are so grateful to Mr Wilkinson for his very generous legacy. The RNLI depends on donations and legacies like his and without such generosity, we would not be able to carry on our vital life saving role.'

Mr Wilkinson, from Altrincham in Cheshire, died in 2001. He was a Life Governor of the RNLI and gave illustrated talks about the



work of the charity. His legacy has also funded a D class inshore lifeboat, which is part of the RNLI's relief fleet.

The Atlantic 85 is the first inshore lifeboat to have radar, which means it can operate more effectively in reduced visibility. It is also faster and bigger than its predecessor, with room for a fourth crew member as well as more space for casualties.

The Atlantic 85 was developed in close

consultation with volunteer crews and a prototype was trialled at lifeboat stations around the coast before the final design went into production

RNLI Divisional
Inspector, North, Andy
Clift said: 'With its
increased speed and
size and technological
advancements like radar,
the Atlantic 85 will
enable our volunteer
lifeboatmen and women
to carry out their life
saving work more safely

and effectively than ever before.'

Silloth RNLI held an appeal in 2007 and raised £33,000 to fund training at their lifeboat station, ensuring the volunteer crew were familiar with their new lifeboat and ready to man it as soon as it arrived.

Their old lifeboat, Spirit of Cumbria, launched 98 times and rescued 53 people while stationed at Silloth. It will now go into the RNLI relief fleet, operating at lifeboat stations when their own Atlantic 75 is being refitted or repaired.

Eyesore Property

Allerdale Borough Council has prosecuted a Silloth man for failing to comply with the Building Act 1984, concerning the state of a dilapidated property in the town.

William George Tinnion, of Greenrow, Silloth, was issued with a Section 79 Notice, under the act, on 17th July 2003 which required him to either renovate or demolish the longdisused shop and house, known as Bank View, on Golf Villas.

In evidence heard at North Cumbria Magistrates Court in Carlisle, the rundown building was declared as being "seriously detrimental to the amenities of the neighbourhood" following complaints made to the Council about its condition.

Mr Tinnion was given 180 days after the notice was served to carry out the required works but an inspection made on 30 January 2004 found that a large majority of the renovation had not been done, nor had the property been demolished.

Allerdale Borough Council wrote to Mr Tinnion on 6 April 2004 informing him it intended to carry out the renovation or demolition work as the statutory notice had not been complied with. He subsequently submitted a planning application to redevelop the property

which was approved in October 2004.

It was expected that the redevelopment would have begun in the following few months but by March 2005 nothing had happened. Further negotiations took place during 2006, 2007 and early 2008 with little progress.

A list of the works still to be completed was sent to Mr Tinnion on 21 May 2008, asking why they had not been done and advising him the Council was considering legal proceedings. A further copy was hand delivered to Mr Tinnion on 6 June 2008.

District Judge Gerald Chalk found Mr Tinnion guilty of failing to comply with the notice under Section 79 of the Building Act 1984, after a trial on Monday.

He was also found guilty of failing to provide information as to the owner of the property after claiming it was jointly-owned, despite the Land Registry confirming it was in sole ownership. A notice under Section 16 of the Local Government (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act 1976 was served on Mr Tinnion on 17 June 2008 – giving him 14 days to supply the requested information to which no response was received.

Mr Tinnion was fined £100 for the first offence and ordered to pay court costs of £300.

People wanting to make alterations to their homes are warned to be aware of changes to planning regulations coming into force this week. The rules which govern the need for planning permission for home alterations changed on Wednesday 1 October.

As a result, some small extensions and outbuildings may no longer need planning permission, while some other changes – including the creation of hard surfaced areas like driveways and patios – will now sometimes need

consent. Special controls will still apply in parts of Allerdale including conservation areas.

If you are thinking of altering your home then Allerdale Borough Council's planning staff can help you understand the new rules and explain whether permission is needed for what you have in mind.

With Christmas on the horizon, once more we were asked to avoid sending bookmark cards and the small cards, because the system could not cope with them, thus hand sorting is necessary and delivery may be slightly delayed. Red envelopes are also difficult for the system to

Gladys Temple thanked Margaret and an insight into their work.


Santa in Silloth






September was the quietest month for many years with only three







Mayors Report

The Chairman announced he had attended 17 events during September and October ranging from the Music & Beer Festival to Harvest Festivals, the Rotary Club Dialect Competition to the celebration of 80 years of Silloth Evangelical Free Church.

The Police Report included theft of diesel fuel, arrests for assault, burglaries and several complaints of large numbers of youths gathering on Eden Street and Wampool Street. In some instances they were throwing eggs and tomatoes at property. Lindsay Noblet stated she was having talks with the school to try and reopen the youth club and would welcome support from anyone willing to be involved. Items for the 2009/10 budget were discussed and it was agreed to include funding for youth facilities following a successful meeting PCSO Noblet held with parents.

Correspondence dealt with included a letter from Home Housing following our complaint over two months regarding a overhanging hedge blocking the footpath adjacent to Petteril Terrace, this will now be maintained in a tidy state. A request for permission to erect a secure fence around the rugby pitch to remove the dog fouling problem which is out of control and must be stopped on grounds of Health & Safety. Once again this is due to irresponsible owners the poor dog is not at fault.

Reports from

representatives included S.T.A.G. who hope to attract several more events to the town in 2009. Regeneration gave notice that the Heritage Lottery bid for the Green had been submitted and that a reply should be heard in early spring. Discussions were held regarding the practice of winter planting of the flower beds, which have suffered with the weather in previous years. Several beds will be looked into and the possibility of a floral design to note the celebration's of the Docks in 2009.

Duncan Spilsbury gave an update on North Allerdale Development Trust and sought further representation from Silloth on the board.

The Longcake Educational Trust have made donations to both the Primary School and Solway C.T.C.

Work has started on replacement of playground equipment with further work to be carried out shortly.

Concern has been raised regarding several youngsters being seen on the railway bridge attempting to jump off the wall onto the trees in front of the bridge, following discussions it was agreed the trees should be removed.

Proposals to resurface the parking area around the Rugby Club/changing rooms are being drawn up with tenders being sought. Details submitted by the Rugby Club to erect secure fencing around the pitch to remove the dog fouling problem were agreed by the council.


Local Athletic Honours

This was a brilliant all round performance from an inexperienced but willing to learn Silloth side.


