

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

Planning Breach

A Silloth woman has been ordered by magistrates to pay £615 after breaching a planning enforcement notice which required her to stop using land for the siting of an unauthorised residential caravan.

Marian Morrow, 66, who owns land at The Paddock, Pelutho, near Silloth, was contacted by Allerdale Borough Council – in its role as the local planning authority – in response to complaints it received from residents about the unauthorised change of use of the land for siting a residential caravan.

The Council served Mrs Morrow with a planning contravention notice on 25 June 2009 and established that planning permission was required for the siting of a residential caravan on the land.

Further letters were sent to Mrs Morrow requesting that she submitted the required planning application but no application was made. Subsequently, Allerdale Borough Council sent a letter to Mrs Morrow informing her of its decision to serve an enforcement notice.

On 21 October 2009,

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the enforcement notice was issued which stated that Mrs Morrow must stop using the land for the purpose of living in a caravan by 10 December 2009, and that she must remove the caravan from the land within four months of that date.

A site visit by an Allerdale Borough Council planning enforcement officer on 14 April 2010 confirmed that Mrs Morrow had not complied with the enforcement notice as the caravan was still being used for residential purposes on the land.

A letter was sent to Mrs Morrow on 20 April 2010 giving her seven days in which to provide details of how she intended to comply with the enforcement notice, and informing her that court proceedings would follow if she failed to do so. No response was received to the letter therefore the Council was left with no other option than to take legal action.

Mrs Morrow pleaded guilty through her solicitor to breaching the terms of the enforcement notice at North Cumbria Magistrates Court in Carlisle today. She was fined £500 and ordered to pay court costs of £100 and a £15 victims surcharge.

Town Council Report

Cllr Ian (Eli) Baty was elected Chairman/Mayor. Cllr Tony Markley was reelected Deputy Chairman. Representatives for

outside bodies - the same people were all re-elected. Inspector Dennis Kelly

introduced our new PCSO Hubert, who has replaced Chrissy who has moved to Aspatria. He went on to outline the crimes that have been dealt with in Silloth within the past month. These included common assault, thefts, criminal damage, plus several cases in relation to drugs offences. Under age drinking has been highlighted as a problem and this is being addressed. Any adult found to be purchasing drink for under-age teenagers will be dealt with by the courts. Other matters dealt with included antisocial behaviour in relation to loud music and youths playing pranks.

Correspondence included concerns over the length of time it is taking to let allotments, this has come about due to several applicants being allocated an allotment then not cultivating them. This means other people on the list see them as not used and think the council are not letting them. In future, allotments must show they are being worked. Further details were on the table regarding the development of the Fison site, however these could not be discussed as no formal planning application has yet been received. 

Allerdale Rural Homes Award

Affordable housing initiative short-listed for national awards

An initiative by Allerdale Borough Council and Westfield Housing Association to offer affordable homes has been short listed for an award from the Government.

The work carried out by the two organisations to buy up empty rural properties and turn them into affordable homes for rent is in the running to win the Innovation and New Ventures category of the Homes and Communities Awards 2010.

Allerdale Borough Council and Westfield Housing Association are competing against six other initiatives from entrants across the country, including Liverpool, Barnsley and Aylesbury Vale.

Councillor Margaret Jackson, Allerdale Borough Council's Executive member with responsibility for Housing Strategy and Support, said: "I am delighted that the hard work and successes of our housing needs officer Angela Harrison, along with the rest of the Council's Housing Services team and its partners, in providing muchneeded affordable homes has been recognised. "This work has

contributed towards the regeneration of Allerdale and supports one of the objectives of the Council's Corporate Plan – to improve the quality of housing and create a balanced housing market; addressing the supply of affordable and social rented accommodation.

"I wish our Housing Services team and our colleagues at Westfield Housing Association the best of luck for the awards and congratulate them for their continued efforts towards making Allerdale a great place to live, work and visit."

The award judges will visit Allerdale over the next month to view examples of more than £2million worth of affordable homes created in the borough, and to be given a presentation by the Council and Westfield Housing Association about the successful initiative.

Graham Howarth, the director of Westfield Housing Association, said: "This is a great boost for our rural affordable homes programme. Many families have moved into our properties and they are all very happy. The production of new social housing is one of the most satisfying elements of the job.

"We've been able to develop this scheme through our close working

relationship with Allerdale Borough Council's Housing Services team. As we identify a suitable property, we get in touch with the Council's housing needs officer to confirm whether the property we're buying will address a rural housing need. We're making sure that public money is being used in the areas where it has the greatest benefit."

Allerdale Borough Council, in conjunction with the Homes and Communities Agency, works with local housing associations to provide affordable homes in the area to rent or buy. The National Affordable Homes Programme offers Government funding to provide affordable homes in areas of need.

Allerdale has the highest successful grant allocation to date across Cumbria, with £12,947,185 already committed and delivering 159 affordable homes, with another £4,390,650 allocated to schemes over the next year - giving the potential to create 164 affordable homes - meaning the Council is on track to meet and even exceed its target of 250 new affordable homes by 2011.

The Homes and Communities Awards will be presented in London on 23 September 2010.

After a break for refreshments, Diana Shaw introduced her Panel Game, a take off of University Challenge. With Diana as




four other members joined her and took questions from certain members of the audience. One of the questions was 'Where is your favourite place in the world and who




REACT Foundation Awards


Abbeytown Adventurers

Tie sweet peas to your trellis and remove tendrils so that the energy goes into producing flowers not greenery.





Today we mourn the passing of a beloved old friend, Common Sense, who has been with us for many years.

No one knows for sure how old he was, since his birth records were long ago lost in bureaucratic red tape. He will be remembered as having cultivated such valuable lessons as:

- Knowing when to come in out of the rain;

- Why the early bird gets the worm; - Life isn't always fair;

- and maybe it was my fault.

Common Sense lived by simple, sound financial policies (don't spend more than you can earn) and reliable strategies (adults, not children, are in charge).

His health began to deteriorate rapidly when well-intentioned but overbearing regulations were set in place. Reports of a 6-year-old boy charged with sexual harassment for kissing a classmate; teens suspended from school for using mouthwash after lunch; and a teacher fired for reprimanding an unruly student, only worsened his condition.


May was another busy month with eleven vessels visiting the port.
