Sister Ships in Silloth

It is not uncommon to see two or more ships in dock at Associated British Ports' (ABP) Port of Silloth at the same time, but this was a particularly rare occasion. On Friday, 30 July, two identical ships were in port together, having both brought large cargoes of agribulks from two widely separated Mediterranean ports.

On Thursday, 29 July MV Pollux arrived from Sfax in Tunisia with nearly 3,500 tonnes of fertiliser. While she was still discharging her cargo in port, MV Perseus arrived with a further 3,200 tonnes from the Spanish port of Sagunto. Both cargoes were for onward delivery to Carrs Milling Industries.

Pollux and Perseus, managed by the German company Wessels and flying the Liberian flag of registry, are fairly new vessels, having been built in 2008 and 2009 respectively. Just two weeks earlier, a third ship of this exact class, MV Theseus built in 2009 - had arrived at Silloth from Aviles in northern Spain, again with over 3,200 tonnes of

agribulks. Chris Puxley, Harbour Master and Port Superintendent, commented: "Seeing both these vessels in dock in one day is a real coup for the port and highlights Silloth's ability to handle large quantities of bulk materials for the agricultural community."

Liz Elliott of John Stronach Shipping Agency in New Dock said: "Two new ships in dock at the same time is unusual in Silloth; two from the same fleet is even more unusual. Vessels from the Arkon fleet are regular visitors to the port and we are always keen to welcome them as they are

problems."

With north Cumbria and the Borders region having a large agricultural market sector, importation of agribulk products through the Port of Silloth has been undertaken almost since the docks were built in 1859.

Interestingly, the "THESEUS" is currently being used in sea trials, to reduce fuel consumption by flying a large kite, similar to that used by kite surfers, from her foremast when wind conditions allow. This kite is reportedly capable of producing around 10 tonnes of bollard pull in favourable circumstances, which could appreciably reduce fuel costs on long sea passages.

All three of these ships have a Gross Tonnage of 2,452 tonnes, a Deadweight (cargo capacity) of approximately 3600 tonnes and are 88 metres long, by 13 metres beam and a loaded draft of 5.5 metres. They are each manned by a crew of seven people.

Looking after these ships, d almost all others that arrive at Silloth is Liz Elliott, at 'John Stronach' Shipping

Agency at New Dock, whilst 'DA Harrison', the licensed stevedore company,

discharges the cargoes and delivers them to the customer.

Be Safe at **Festival Time**

Councillor Ron Munby, Executive member with responsibility for Licensing, said:

By all means, enjoy the local hospitality, but please be sensible and don't drive home. Allerdale Borough Council licences taxis, both hackney carriages and private hire vehicles, to ensure your safety Licenses for vehicles and drivers are issued by the Council

annually and there are a number of conditions which must be met. Vehicles must be under four years of age before being licensed for the first time. The correct insurance, MOT, vehicle registration document and a mechanical test must be in place first. These documents are checked annually and once a vehicle is over five years additional checks include a full service history and an engineer's test. Drivers must undergo an enhanced Criminal Records Bureau check, doctor's medical, Driving Standards Agency test and have their driving licence checked. If a vehicle in Allerdale has not been licensed by Allerdale Borough Council, then all the checks may not have been done. Have fun but stay safe and use a licensed taxi."


SOSCS





Jane is Senior Heritage Management Consultant for Capita Symonds Ltd and has been involved in many restoration projects. One of these was an old building in the village of Dent, Yorkshire. She was also involved in the restoration of Abbey House, Whitby, whilst working for English Heritage. She went on to explain the project and how it was funded by the Heritage Lottery Fund, E.U. Development Fund, Youth Hostel Association and the current owners Stricklan Estate. The whole project cost £3.3million and is now a Youth Hostel. With the help of slides she described some of the restoration work that

had taken place and pointed out the Abbots lodging which was situated in part of Abbey House. The building itself is a Grade 1 listed building with a great history.


Another project that she has been involved with is Mealbank Colliery at Ingleton which has a Hoffmann Kiln and the local community want to preserve this as a site of scientific interest. Several options are being considered for this site.

A current project is a new Visitor Centre for Maryport. The Hadrians Wall Heritage Trust have purchased Camp Farm, built in 1866, which they want to turn into the Visitor Centre. It is hoped that an archeological dig will take place and that some of the farm building can be used to house those who will be taking part in the dig. This is a huge project with a great future.

A vote of thanks was given by Jean Graham. After a break for refreshments the General stall at the Vintage Rally and a beach clean. A discussion to consider prizes for the monthly raffle took place and it was agreed that the status quo would prevail at least until the AGM.

Correspondence were read out including invitations to other WI's in the region. One of the letters received was from a lady in Shropshire who wrote to thank the WI and the Silloth Community for the assistance she had received on a recent visit whilst she was researching her family history.

Pat Bell read out a report that had been received from Jane Miller who attended the National AGM in Cardiff on behalf of the local area. This was a very comprehensive report and gave details of the various points touched upon at the Conference including the cost of the new logo. expressed his "surprise at the range of subject- matter contained in it and the differing moods this evokes".



Fur Feathers and Fantastic I feel very fortunate to live in such a beautiful place as Cumbria. True, I am not a 'born and bred' Cumbrian – but for the 25 plus years I have lived here, it has certainly become my 'home'.

One of the many things I enjoy about where I live is the wildlife. It was not until I moved out of the City and came to Cumbria that my eyes were opened. With the little knowledge I have acquired over the years, I have formed a real appreciation and passion for what is on my doorstep. I am sitting writing this article in my conservatory with all of the doors and windows wide open. The air is full of the excited little chitter chatter of the Swallows as they sit perched on the telephone wire above the house. They sound like an excited group of teenagers about to go on their first date ...

The outbuildings are full of this beautiful bird and I love to watch them as they soar in out feeding their young. They have already raised their first brood, and these have taken to the air learning their acrobatic flying skills, gaining weight as well as strength, for when they leave our shores in late summer to migrate back to the Southern Hemisphere and a warmer climate. If they survive that journey and over winter safely they will return again next year,

to raise their young, in exactly (if able) the same spot as they did this year. So, the birds you have nesting in your barn, shed or wherever will more likely than not be the same birds you see again next year – incredible for such a tiny bird.

So, how do these birds and others, find their way backwards and forwards year after year? After all, they have no satellite navigation system telling them to take the first left and then proceed for x amount of miles etc – or do they?

Studies suggest birds orientate themselves to the compass points using the position of the sun during the day, and the stars at night. They can also sense magnetic north. In addition, they use other clues such as visual layout of the land, smell (of the sea), sound (waves on shores, winds through mountain passes).

The most amazing aspect of bird migration is that the location, route and perhaps even the techniques are hard-wired into their brains. And, we think we are the

clever ones!

Mornings are not the best time of the day for me, and especially not 5:30am! However, on this particular morning, my alarm call was not unwelcome! One of the young Buzzards had obviously flown the nest and was not altogether sure about things. It had taken up residence on a fence post, (not a million miles away from the bedroom window) and decided to send out a 'May Day distress call' to its parents. Buzzards have a very piercing mewing call - a very 'loud' call. This young Buzzard sat there for almost an hour giving full vent to its vocal chords. Eventually one of the parents circled overhead and 'mewed' back, the young Buzzard hesitated, looked upwards and continued calling.

Being basically ignored it decided enough was enough and it flew towards the tree they are nesting in.

The mewing went on and off for most of the day (from a distance) until this particular Buzzard finally got its bearings and decided it was ok to go solo.

This breeding pair raised four young last year; I have only seen two so far this year. Perhaps the long extended cold snap has taken its toll on the food chain.

Later that evening two Tawny Owls took to sending love calls across the airways, or it could have been two males staking claim to their territory. We do seem to have a thriving Tawny Owl population around here.

Just as I was about to shut down for the night the long eerie screech of a Barn Owl (Barn Owls do not hoot) could be heard as it flew past - believe me, they are not nicknamed 'screech owls' for nothing. You could be forgiven for thinking it was the sound of someone screaming for help, or the sound effects from some ghostly horror movie! A walk through any grave yard late at night, and the sound of the Barn Owl screeching out, would soon have you running! This beautiful bird, although certainly not vocally silent, is as quiet in flight as the Tawny Owl, as in fact are all Owls, owing to their cleverly designed feathers; this silent flight allows them to capture their prey with ease.

My last sighting for the week was of two beautiful Roe Deer in the barley field opposite me. With only their little heads visible, there they sat, keeping a look out on the village. If one raised its head so would the other – what another beautiful start to the day.

All of this has been seen and heard from the comfort of my own home, wildlife is all around us, we just need to stop, look and listen – and appreciate what we have on our own doorstep.

Priceless in every sense of the word!
