Carnival spokesman


Steve Pattinson says "We're really excited about the 2011 carnival. The atmosphere is always fantastic and it'll be great to see the whole village joining together to party".

Have Your Say

Time for change? Ideas for the future of Cumbria's libraries. Cumbria County Council has launched the first stage in a conversation it wants to have with you about the future shape of the county's library service.

Across the UK councils have been consulting with the people they serve about the future of library services. These consultations have frequently begun as a result of reductions in library service budgets which have prompted councils to consider the closure of branches.

In Cumbria councillors have chosen not to reduce the budget for the library service in 2011/12. However, with council budgets under pressure they must be confident that all services are delivering best value. Added to this is the fact that nationally and locally library visitor numbers have been

dropping (a 20% decrease in Cumbria since 2005). They think it is time to change Cumbria's library service to reflect the needs of the people of Cumbria better.

Cumbria County Council have set up a dedicated consultation website where you can share your ideas and opinions with the council and fellow residents. Go online to cumbria.gov.uk for more information.

They want to involve you right at the start, before the council has firm proposals and well before any decisions are made. This first stage will last until 30th June. After that the council will review all the feedback it has received and take a decision as to whether to progress to a second stage of more formal consultation on specific proposals for change. This second stage will probably take place between September and November.



Displaying and selling Wood carved, Wood crafted items, along with other Arts & Craft objects, that have been made/crafted by the groups' members and members of the community. 2, To enable local people of all ages, to acquire skills through the Workshop and Gallery by making, displaying and selling their work, which would be finished to a high standard. This will benefit their community and themselves, both directly and indirectly. The Space will be working

How The idea for the Space came about:

Silloth Community Hall has recently had more groups (Age Concern, MANA Credit Union and a Church group) stop using the hall. It was recognized, that Silloth Town Council were left with a building that was being used less and less. The opportunity arose for the one remaining group to propose a new way forward. They proposed a new Partnership, a partnership between Silloth Town Council and Clive Firth; who founded, runs and has managed The Solway Wood Carving Group (BWA) since October 2006.

Clive, along with members of Solway Wood Carving group committee decided that having the hall refurbished would enhance and encourage a great deal more use of the hall, by not only the local community, but also the visitors to the town and the communities of the whole of the North West coast and surrounding area of Cumbria.

By offering courses, classes, a wet weather venue for local events and a visitor attraction, to encourage more visitors and keep them here to spend their money in the town, local area and Cumbria as a whole..

There is a lot of work to be done, the renovations have yet to start, it is up to 'The Space Ltd' to create it's own income.

To do this volunteers are needed to help manage and develop idea's, steward events, etc.

A New Rector

Silloth will have a new vicar in September, or to be precise a new Rector. The Reverend Bryan Rothwell who is currently vicar of Threlkeld has been appointed Rector to the Solway Plain Team Ministry of which Silloth and Causewayhead are part and he will be based in Silloth. As Rector, Bryan will have charge of all seven churches in the team - the others are Abbeytown, Holme St Cuthberts, Bromfield, Waverton and Westnewton. He will be Vicar of Silloth but will also direct the work of the Ministry Team, taking some

As well as being vicar of both Threlkeld and St John's in the Vale, Bryan Rothwell has been in charge of Carlisle Diocesan Youth Centre, welcoming hundreds of young people who come to stay in the Lake District to share outdoor activities and spiritual time together. He and his wife Anne Louise have three sons of their own and look forward to meeting other parents and young people.

Bryan's official licensing will take place on September 5th.

And speaking of Christ Church.

The appointment of a new full-time priest reminds us of the price we pay for keeping Silloth's parish church open and maintaining all the services and opportunities that it provides.

Not everyone may be aware that the Church of England today does not have the great financial resources of a hundred or even fifty years ago. There is no central reserve providing dividends from investment. Church members have to pay for the upkeep of buildings and the salaries of clergy out of what we receive each week from regular givers, fund-raising events, the Parish Magazine and so on.

All churches in the Diocese of Carlisle contribute to a central fund for the payment of clergy and, while some are relatively wealthy and can help

subsidise their neighbours, most parishes cannot afford to pay the full cost of the vicar or curate who serves them. In the Solway Plain Team we can afford to pay just part of one person's salary and for some years Christ Church Silloth has only been paying its share by running at a loss and spending literally thousands of pounds out of what reserve we had. We have to cut back on our contribution to the central fund and that means the Diocese will have less to pay clergy.

We are mainly dependent on the generosity of people who attend the church or donate on a regular basis through our envelope and Gift Aid schemes but Christ Church also functions as an important focus for the community. Most local residents were baptised there, often married there and have attended the funerals of friends and loved ones there. It is the place for the Remembrance Day service and for Christmas and Easter celebrations. The schools hold services there. People tell the time by the clock - even though it isn't always quite in agreement with Greenwich! The spire is the landmark for visitors and tourists.

To use the language of the politicians, everyone in Silloth has a stake in the Parish Church. Experiencing Easter

She began by explaining what were believed to be the origins of Belly Dancing and went on to explain the history of the subject. This proved to be a fascinating insight into this art form. She also explained that because it was mainly done in a Muslim country that most of the dancers were of Western origin as it was not considered suitable for a female inhabitant of these countries to participate. The origins date back to 2000

BC and was believed to be a type of fertility dance in the sense that it gave women the suppleness for child birth, ie for using a birthing stool. It was only during the reign of one of the Kings of France that the origins of women lying on their backs to give birth began, as this particular king wanted to see his child born. Today women have a choice as to how they give birth.

She then went on to demonstrate the various moves which make up the art of Belly Dancing and also got members to join in and 'have a go'. This caused lots of hilarity. Most of the costumes she uses were bought at Charity Shops although she did have some special costumes which had been purchased at various Belly Dancing conventions.

The whole evening was

not only a revelation but also an insight to this particular art form.

Labour Party councillors took control of 28 seats – exactly half of those on the Council – with 12 for the Conservatives; 10 going to independents and six seats taken by councillors who had declared no party.

The Leader of the Labour Group, Councillor Alan Smith, will discuss the plans with the rest of the Labour councillors at the Group's Annual General Meeting on Sunday 15 May 2011.

Councillor Smith said: "We are the largest group with exactly half the seats on the Council so we have a mandate to form an administration, which is what we will do."

The RNLI SOS bottle is being passed from station to station by Round Table members aiming to cover some 7,000 miles in 114 days and fund-raising for the RNLI along the way.

The message calls for the local community to support SOS day, the RNLI's biggest fund-raising day, which takes place in January every year.

The President of the National Association of Round Tables of Great Britain and Ireland, John Kilshaw, has made the RNLI his Presidential Charity, from May 2010 until May 2011.

John is asking his 6,000 Round Table members (575 clubs around the UK and Republic of Ireland) to join together to raise over £150,000 for crew training during this period.

He says 'as President, I wanted to support a charity that receives no UK Government funding, covers both Great Britain



and Ireland, relates to our members and affects each and every one of us, whether

at sea, inland or at the beach.' The relay started at the Round Table Headquarters

in Birmingham on 14th

January and ended in Blackpool on 6th May.

We would like to thank the parents who helped and a special big thank you to the kind management and staff who made our visit exciting and fantastic, and a special thanks to Felix.



Exercise Portside at Silloth Dock



A Fire Service emergency exercise code-named 'Portside' took place in Silloth Docks on the 12th May involving the RNLI, Coastguard Agency, Associated British Ports and Fire and Rescue Service crews from Silloth, Aspatria and Maryport.

The exercise started with

a report being made to Silloth docks that an explosion had taken place on board the fishing vessel 'Solway Provider' with several people being reported as missing.

Silloth Fire Station responded quickly to the scene with a Fire engine and Land Rover unit. The Fire Service observed two persons in the water close to the fishing vessel and quickly summoned assistance from Silloth lifeboat station. The fire-fighters then donned specialist breathing apparatus in order to go onboard the fishing boat, put the fire out, and commence a search for additional missing persons. At the same time other firefighters inflated a rescue hose and threw rescue lines to help the floundering persons in the dock.

Within minutes the Lifeboat had arrived and started recovery of the casualties from the water, they then kept the Liverpool Coastguard closely updated from the scene using their boats powerful VHF radio. More Fire Service units arrived, this time from Aspatria and Maryport, and soon two more teams in breathing apparatus joined the search inside the cramped confines of the boat. Two more casualties were found by the fire teams, one inside the engine room and another located in the vessels hold, they were quickly recovered and bought to the safety

of the dock side, where the exercise was deemed complete. A de-brief was held at the RNLI station to discuss proceedings and thank all those involved, in particular members of the retained fire service, the RNLI and local fisherman Joe Ray who kindly provided the boat for the exercise to take place.

Arthritis Group

Unfortunately several members sent their apologies but we were pleased to welcome Kathryn Chisholme as a new member.

Paul Gibson,
Rheumatology Specialist
Nurse, North Cumbria
University Hospitals
NHS Trust needed no
introduction as he is a
welcome visitor who often
speaks to our group. Over
the past ten years there have
been dramatic changes in
the treatment of many of
the inflammatory and noninflammatory conditions.

The Government have begun to realise how much Arthritis is costing the NHS and the economy. More than six million people in the UK have painful Osteo-Arthritis of the knees and 8.5 million have x-ray evidence of Osteo-Arthritis in the spine and back pain is the commonest symptom. Ten million working days were lost during 2006/07 due to musculoskeletal conditions which cost £5.7 Billions to the UK. There have been major advances in the

treatment of Osteo-Arthritis and while there is still no cure for it treatments are improving to help remission. A person newly diagnosed with Rheumatoid arthritis no longer has to inevitably look forward to deteriorating function, mobility and loss of independence. If they are promptly referred and diagnosed the treatment should mean any joint damage and functional deterioration will be minimal. These are at very early stages of research but it does give more hope that there will be alternatives to joint surgery in the future.

The mainstay of treatment of Osteo-Arthritis is still pain relief in its many forms and Paul listed many different ways this can be achieved. Osteoporosis has seen the introduction of targeted screening to identify those at risk and the prevention of falls, etc. The advent of more effective tolerated treatments has simplified treatment with IV bisphosphonates and treatments to both simulate

bone growth itself and prevent thinning.

Joan Gilbertson thanked Paul for a very interesting and informative talk.

Anne Graham, Edna Marper and Margaret Armstrong served refreshments and Kathryn Chisholme won the raffle.

Everyone then relaxed to listen to a pain relief CD. The next meeting is on 3rd June at Loveday House, the speaker will be Keith Morley on Hypnotherapy.

Jack 'Wingy' Scott




Jack 'Wingy' Scott was an artisan member at Carlisle and Silloth GC on either side of the First World War, who played with distinction, despite only having his right arm. A Silloth member, Mr Ward, became involved in a discussion with a member of Leasowe GC on the Wirral, about Scott's chances against another one-armed player, John Haskins of the Hoylake Village club. Haskins too, was one-armed, played over the famous links of Royal Liverpool GC and had already taken part in challenge matches. The first match between the two men was played over the Leasowe links, in front of a big crowd. Haskins went round in 75 to Scott's 79 to win by 4/3. A return home and home match for a £20 stake was then played in the summer of 1909. Wingy had ample

revenge, ending 5 up after the first 36 holes at Silloth. Silloth GC member David Low recently acquired the first picture, which shows the two protagonists before the Silloth match. The second, from the Club archives, shows Scott lining up his putt on the first green of what, from the direction of shadows, looks like the second round. Haskins is

wearing rather a natty white jacket. Wingy continued his good form, was seven up after 22 holes of the Hoylake Championship Links, and withstood a late charge from Haskins to win the stake money by 3/1.

Banty Trot Golf Competition


