Get Fit Dancing

There is an exciting new dance fitness class in Silloth.

Moky are a hugely popular dance fitness team with over forty classes across Cumbria and with recent expansion into the North East (Haltwhistle) and the Borders. They now see over 2,000 people

per week in their classes, and are inundated with requests from local Cumbrian's (often in more rural areas) to set up new classes in their town. The growth has been exponential; in January 2010 they had their first class with sixty people in attendance, this has now more than tripled in size to today where that same class has grown to three classes and now has over two hundred people in total throughout the evening.

One of the most noticeable increases in class sizes has been that of their weekly Wigton class in Wigton Market Hall, which started out with fifty people back in September 2010 and has grown rapidly since then, to the point where



they have had to put on a second class on another day to meet the huge demand. On the first night they saw seventy people packed into the Market Hall, as well as seeing over one hundred each week at our regular Monday class. They have now added a class in Silloth to meet the heavy demand there in Solway Community School.

As well as classes, they also do displays and events, and are booked to take part in both Abbeytown and Silloth Carnivals this year. Moky provide colourful, energetic and uplifting displays and do draw in the crowds.

Moky classes not only get people happier, healthier and

fitter, but they also alleviate the isolation felt by so many living in rural communities.

Moky see people of both sexes, from 16 to 85 year olds, and every size, shape and body in between. They all have one goal in common: having fun, meeting new people and sharing a hobby while getting fit, happy and healthy. Many of their customers have lost weight by coming to Moky, but it is the emotional and mental benefits that all their customers feel - check out their facebook page (www. facebook.com/mokyfit) for the hundreds of comments received every week from ardent fans who can't get enough of Moky in their lives.

Anyone for Bridge?

Bridge is a card game which evolved from whist. Historically, whist was definitely played in the16th century. [There is a published reference to whist in a sermon by Bishop Latimer in 1529.] Originally the game of whist was played in the Royal Court and high places in the Kingdom. Over the intervening centuries, whist gradually spread into the lower ranks including: Lords of the Manor, army officers and soldiers, city workers, lawyers, bankers, trade merchants, etc. The first book on whist appeared in 1742 [Hoyle's Short Treatise on Whist] and this immediately became a best seller.

Very briefly by about 1890, the game was developing into a form of auction bridge; however it took another 35 years before the scoring details were sorted out and Contract Bridge was established. [A rich American on his yacht in 1925 worked out the scoring system which is still in use today]. Once this was achieved, World Bridge took off.

During the 1930's there were often International headlines in the Times Newspaper for matches between the USA and GB, as now with the cricket test scores.

There is a story about Omar Sharif who was on a film set, Dr Zhivago, and was told to go back to his caravan (on the film set) until required for his next scene. He had access to the studio's library, so went to the one bookcase there and had a look. He decided to take the least interesting looking book, which was rather dusty and infrequently used, to read, as then he thought, he could then get back to his filming scenes without too much effort. However the director couldn't find him for three days as he had got so engrossed in his bridge book! He later became a world class player!

Fortunes have been won and lost with both whist and bridge! Although most players do not gamble, Lords and rich players can win or lose lots of money. Most players play Duplicate Bridge; which is not played for money. Note: Omar lost at least one fortune at cards!

In southern England, there are now many bridge clubs, and whist has largely

died out. In the north, this appears to be whist country and whist still appears to be one of the dominant social games. After the war, many countries supported teams and a world series is now played every year with many countries competing.

Learning to play bridge is not easy, there is a great deal to remember and the students (we are all students) never reach a point when they can own up to being perfect players. However, it is a very challenging game and very enjoyable to pit ones wits against other players. I feel that compared to whist, whist is left far behind, as in bridge, one is learning continuously. In the Duplicate Game, played in most bridge clubs, identical hands are played by the different partnerships and their scores are compared, which means that however poor the hand, there is still a good chance of winning. {When the game is played for money, it is then called "Rubber" Bridge and is dependent to some extent on the strength of the hands dealt. Rubber Bridge is often found in golf clubs and in some other card clubs.}

Currently, a bridge group meet at the Silloth golf club for the occasional game and newcomers are very welcome.

Wind Turbines Dock in Silloth

July has seen one of the more unusual cargo's being handled at the port of Silloth, in the form of four wind turbines for the Hellrigg wind farm. Travelling from Emden in Germany to their destination just four miles outside of the town, the first turbines were delivered on the vessel 'Wilson Calais' and the remaining two on her sister ship, the 'Wilson Cadiz'.

Built in 2001 the ships are owned by Wilson line of Norway, sailing under the Barbados flag. At 99 meters in length and weighing 4,432 tonnes deadweight, these were amongst some of the longest ships handled at the port. They were well suited to carry cargo on deck, due to the height of the ships navigational bridge.

Being the first time that Silloth docks has handled wind turbines, it was going to be interesting to test the ports suitability. It soon became apparent that the port and the town have an excellent infrastructure for dealing with this type of cargo. Those involved in the discharge and transport arrangements remarked on how smooth the operation went, and how it had generated such an interest with members of the public.

As for the wind turbines, they are manufactured by Enercon, a German company based in Bremen. This type of turbine has only been in production for about a year and is of the latest generation offering much improved performance and reliability. Each turbine is made up of four steel tower sections and three blades. The fibreglass blades are 40 meters in length and weigh only 9 tonnes each, they are designed to reduce noise and

maintain good efficiency. Each turbine stands 120 meters tall when measured from ground level to the tip of the upward blade, the complete unit weighs in at 430 tonnes.

Power generation takes place behind the nose cone in a similar way to that of a dynamo. Electricity is fed to the ground by cable, this design has removed the





need for the turbines to have gearboxes. Every 12 seconds the turbine adjusts to changes in wind direction to optimise its performance. It starts to generate electricity at wind speeds of approximately 8 miles per hour, and only shuts down into 'storm mode' when the constant wind speed exceeds 60 mph. The four turbines are reported to provide enough power for 5,700 homes.

Dear Buzz,

We have recently been spending our annual holiday in the Lake District. Being a Cumbrian, I need to recharge my batteries in the county I love.

This year my husband agreed to take me on a "memory" tour of Silloth and the Solway Coast. I had not been back for at least 40 years. What happened to the grass tennis courts I spent so much time playing on? We walked along the promenade towards the docks. I remember as a little girl spending happy hours in the glassed shelter in the pine trees on the hill. Further on a smart RNLI station, then the harbour area. We then walked to the Post Office which was a clothing store in my day and so along Criffel Street. I moved to Silloth with my parents about 1935 to a house long gone, near the Skinburness Hotel, how things have changed! We returned to Silloth to the Tourist Office that indeed had

the "Wow" factor. It was situated in the old school hall, where I remember sitting at large cast iron and wooden desks. I also spent a few times in the corner, next to a tea chest of jam jars. From that school I passed

my 11+ with another girl, Edith Ritchie, we proudly went to the then Thomlinson school, where I ended up head girl and games captain. Happy days!

My father part owned a garage opposite the Queen Hotel when we moved to Lattrigg Street. When war broke out he worked on the aerodrome. He was captain in the Home Guard and I well remember Saturday night visits to their HQ's and changing our battery for the radio on the way. Behind Lattrigg St. were the huts for the aircraftmen. At times, Polish, Finish and Czech pilots escaping the Germans, came to Silloth and had nowhere to stay, so we had camp beds in our sitting room. It was a time when local people were very suspicious of

So many memories come flooding back and I often wonder where all my school friends have gone. The year 1947 was a tough one as Silloth was cut off by snow. It took a week to break through and get trains and buses running, even the sea froze. It was a carefree life, cycling everywhere, playing tennis, days on the beach and ghoulish as we children were, searching for debris of crashed aircraft in the sea. We had a Sunday treat meeting friends in a cafe on the way to the station and indulging in huge icecream parfaits! When I left the Thomlinson School I went onto Chelsea college of P.E. and my career took me to Hong Kong, Bangkok and finally back to Surrey. I had met many people but my childhood days hold many happy memories, especially Silloth.

Maybe Allerdale Council don't much care about Silloth, but it is up to the Town council to fight for what they were elected to do, and that is, fight for the rights of the council tax payers of Silloth to demand their rights. I have travelled all over the world in many parts and countries and always found cemeteries revered, but not it seems at home!
