Quad Bike Stuck on Beach

Silloth RNLI lifeboat launched on 20th July at lunchtime to a quadbike and driver who were stuck in the mud on the beach at Skinburness, Silloth.

The Marsh Herd was using his quadbike to search the beach for any livestock which may be missing as

there had been reports of various animals being washed up on the shore.

Recently there have been two dead cows and a sheep recovered from the sea at Silloth.

Local Lifeboat Operations Manager, Eddie Studholme, thought it necessary to launch the lifeboat to assist with the recovery of the quad. By this

time the tide had turned and was flooding in quickly, Eddie was also concerned that the driver may get stuck in the mud trying to recover the quad on his own. The lifeboat stood by and the crew assisted with the recovery by using the lifeboat launching tractor, driven by road to the scene, to winch the quadbike out of the mud safely.

Causewayhead WI

On 13th July Causewayhead WI held their monthly meeting at Trinity Methodist Church, Solway Street, Silloth. As President, Olga Hetherington, was unwell, Sue Wilson, Vice President took the meeting.

Sue welcomed members and introduced our speaker for the evening David Colborn who gave a talk on Bee-keeping. David began by outlining the history of bee-keeping which as far as can be established began as early as 3,000 BC. There is evidence that the collecting of honey from bees was taking place in India and also in Cameroon. In 2,450 BC Egyptian paintings show honey gathering and bee-keeping. He then went on to explain the various types of bees in a hive and their hierarchy from the Queen to the Drones. This proved to be a fascinating insight into the workings of each

member of the hive. He also demonstrated how a hive is constructed and explained in detail each part of the hive. David then donned the outfit that bee-keepers wear when dealing with the bees and to gather the honey from the hives. Different bee-keepers use other types of clothing



and methods, but he prefers the complete outfit to cover up against bee stings. Another aspect David explained was the bee stings, and explained with computer graphics and pictures the difference between bee stings and wasp stings, and stated that once a bee has lost its sting it dies.

Several members raised questions on the various

aspects regarding bee-keeping which David was only too pleased to answer. A vote of thanks was given by Brenda Dowdell on behalf of the members.

Churches Together in Silloth will be contributing to Silloth Carnival again this year.

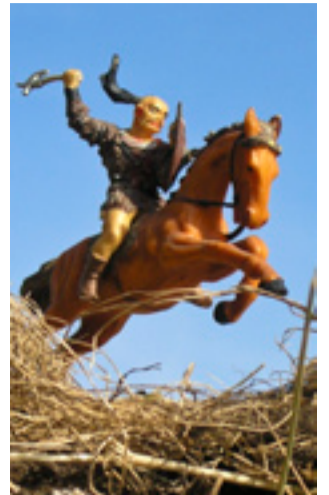

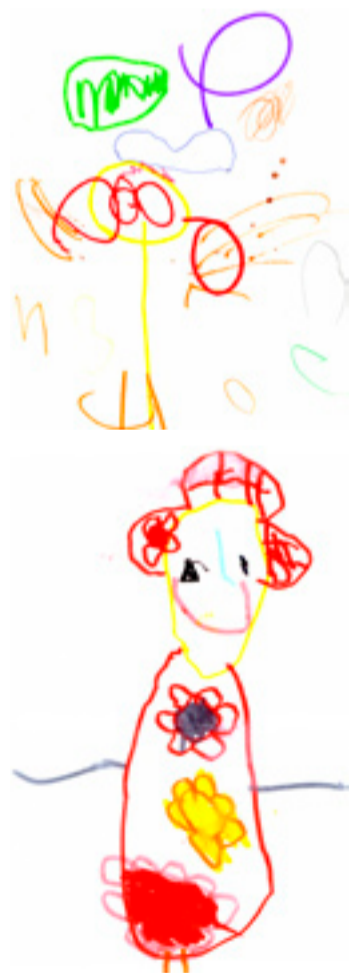
and will be shared between the RNLI and two Cancer Charities.

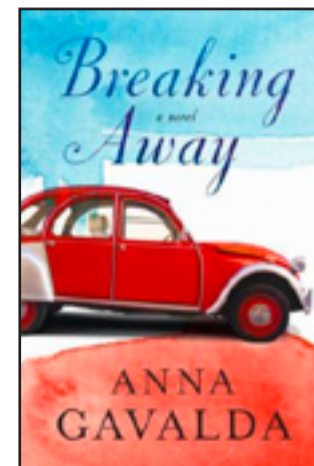

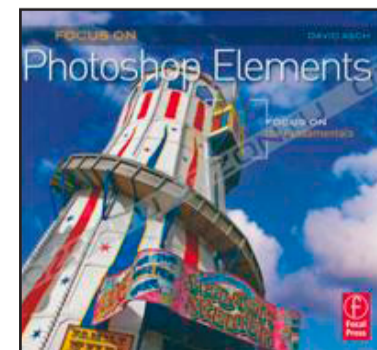

July started off very busy then became quiet, however seven ships visited the port.

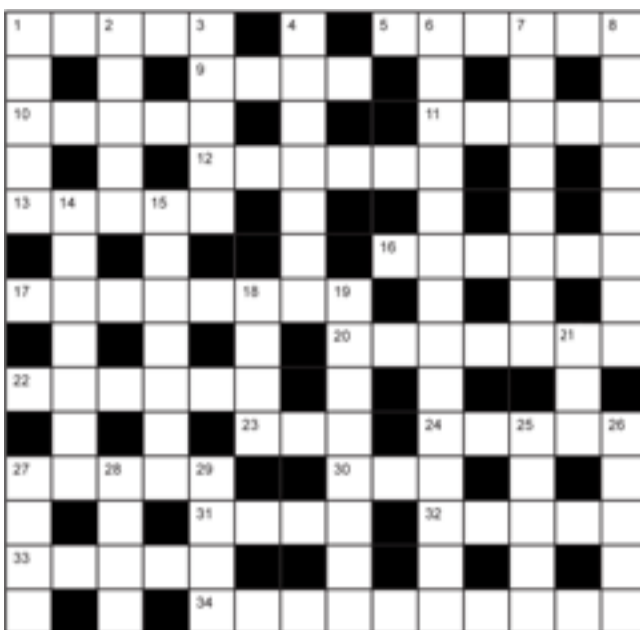
The first was the PELEUS with fertilizer from Gydna, closely followed by the SUDERAU with fertilizer from Ternuezen.

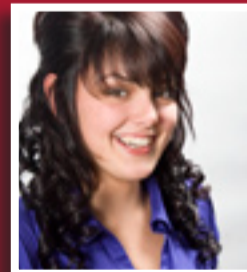
